Kit and CanCan have been in counseling to help with their tenuous relationship. Their therapist believes that they are in a sadomasochistic relationship, since it's Kit's decision to use CanCan to inflict spankings & slaps on himself. Psychiatrist Dr. Neel Burton asserts that consensual sadomasochism should not be confused with acts of aggression. "the sadist may derive pleasure from feelings of power, authority, and control." Burton continues, "the masochist...taking on a role of subjugation and helplessness can offer a release from stress or the burden of responsibility or guilt".

What is unique in this relationship, is that Kit takes on both roles as sadist & masochist by slapping himself around with CanCan's body.

MARROW DOES THE BODY GOOD



BONE MARROW & PARROTS

Typically in the companion parrot world, food encompasses fruit, vegetables, grains, healthy seeds, sprouts & pellets. What about bone marrow?

Bone marrow is a nutritionally dense food that people & animals alike have relied on for as long as recorded history. Before the days of grocery stores, pre-packaged food & supplements, bone marrow was vital for providing essential nutrients during cold months & times of poor crops or famine.

Bone marrow is an excellent source of omega-3, calcium, copper, iron, selenium, zinc, and vitamins A, B2, B12, D, E, and K.

But is a good for parrots?

The consensus from Avian veterinarians: yes, but in small amounts.

THE CONS:

Bone marrow is high in linoleic acid (Omega-6 fatty acids), which scientists say have been shown to be harmful to parrots. The high fat content of bone marrow can lead to atherosclerosis if consumed too often. There is also a safety concern with the bones splintering. Sharp bone splinters can perforate the esophagus, block the digestive tract, or be a choking hazard. It's advised that cooked bones be cut in half for your parrots to avoid bone splinters.

Raw bones should never be offered.

So remember: cooked, cut and sparing portions to get the most out of bone marrow for a healthy parrot.

Representing all of West Africa is an honor for Senegal Parrots.


